



October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. It is an annual campaign to increase the awareness of the disease. For the entire month, <u>Level Up</u> will be providing you with valuable information focused on education and support.

According to <u>The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention</u> (CDC), breast cancer is the most common cancer in women in the United States. Deaths from breast cancer have declined over time but remain the second leading cause of cancer death among women overall and the leading cause of cancer death among Hispanic women.

The CDC further notes that each year in the United States, about 250,000 cases of breast cancer are diagnosed in women and about 2,300 in men. About 42,000 women and 510 men in the U.S. die each year from breast cancer. Over the last decade, the rate of getting breast cancer has not changed for women overall, but the rate has increased for black women and Asian and Pacific Islander women.
