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






Justifiable Homicides by Law Enforcement



Likelihood of a traffic stop compared to race's share of driving population



Berkeley Police Stops and Searches by Race






In an eight-month period, African-Americans made up 62 percent of the people Oakland police stopped for questioning.

Stops that led to searches





Trend and Analysis

The agency has been successful in improving the percent of homicide cases closed since 2009. Maintaining enhanced staffing of homicide investigators, training and declining homicide rates have contributed to this success. The agency has been able to maintain a closure rate of approximately 80%, while the national average has been 60%. CY 2020 estimate is expected to increase as additional cases close.

Trend and Analysis

The agency has been successful in decreasing the number of property crimes in the County. In 2019, the agency property crime numbers were reduced by 17.9% although the case closure rate remains flat. Property crimes constitute about 80% of the entire agency investigative caseload.


Police Cadet IAT Results





Reimagining Community Policing

- Experience the community rather than just police the community
- "In a 2015 <u>report</u> on 21st-century <u>policing</u>, a federal task force recommended police departments institute 'residency incentive programs' that provide officers housing in public housing neighborhoods as long as they fulfill public safety duties within the neighborhood."

Where Officers Live is about Race

• "In communities where the nonwhite population was less than 10%, the average police residency rate was about 47%. But in majority nonwhite cities, it was only 27%."

- In Minneapolis, just 8% of officers lived in the city in 2017
- In New York City, 61% resided in the city
 - 76% of Black and Latino officers
 - 45% of White officers




